<u>Scheme of Options:</u> All questions are compulsory. There is no overall choice in the question paper. However, internal choice to be given in 1 Short Answer Type Question of 4 marks (1x4=4marks), 1 Short Answer Type

Question (1x3=3 marks) and in 2 Long Answer Questions (2x5=10marks). Thus, total choice is of 17 marks.

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Types of questions may include:

Text Book and Grammar section

infer the meaning of unfamiliar words from the context while reading a variety of texts refer to the dictionary, for spelling, meaning and to find out synonyms and antonyms understand the use of synonyms, such as 'big/large', 'shut/ close', and antonyms like inside/outside, light/dark from clues in context

relate ideas, proverbs and expressions in the stories that they have heard, to those in their mother tongue/surroundings/cultural context

describe and narrate incidents; and for framing questions

locates details and sequence of events

Crossword puzzles, word chain etc.

Use linkers to indicate connections between words and sentences such as 'Then', 'After that', etc. Patterns: can be given, jumbled words /posters/picture reading: (what all can you see., what the person might be giving to him?, what will this person do?, where will he take it? what happens in the market / which vehicle is this?) / organized. Sequencing / character description

Reading Section:

multiple choice; identifying the topic/function of the text; identifying information (True/False/Not Given); identifying the writer's views/claims (Yes/No/Not Given); matching information; matching headings; shortanswer questions; error correction; matching; cloze; gap filling; sentence completion and open questions.

Texts for reading comprehension can be taken from a range of authentic sources such as: journals, newspapers, web articles, magazines, extracts from academic books and scientific articles, cartoons/ pictures/comic strips, signs and directions in public places, pamphlets, and suggested websites for language learning

Extracts may be monologue/solo speakers or based on conversations between two or more speakers either in a face to face situation or on the telephone

Writing Section

a statement in which candidates must respond to, for example: responding to an argument, statement or point of view. Word count: 40 to 50 words. Informal letter/formal, message, email.

Creative writing: write a 'mini biography' and 'mini autobiography'

to write creatively (stories, poems, posters, etc)

to write on peace, equality etc suggesting personal views

appreciates in writing the variety in food, dress, customs and festivals as read/heard in his/her day-to day life, in storybooks/ heard in narratives/ seen in videos, films etc
